MINUTES OF MEETING FOR WORSHIP WITH ATTENTION TO BUSINESS

Fourteenth Day of the Second Month, 2010. Present were: Barbara T. (Clerk), Marcia O. (Recording Clerk) with 22 other Friends and attenders. Our Meeting began with centering worship.

Ministry & Worship Committee: Marcia O. reporting:

Request was made and approved to hold the annual Spiritual State of the Meeting worship sharing at 11:25, during Meeting for Worship on Second Month 28th Day. This year's queries for the worship sharing were distributed. All committee clerks are reminded to send their annual reports for 2009 to Elise.

Treasurer's Report: Joel R. reporting: The Meeting's 2009 accounting ended with a positive balance, to be discussed by the Stewardship & Finance Committee. Some \$3000 from the Quaker Market proceeds have been divided and distributed to the Alternatives to Violence Project and the Lighthouse Shelter.

Stewardship & Finance Committee: Mary K. reporting: Adjustments to the accounts have been made so that all core Committee requests have been budgeted. Any special requests for funds, by committees need to be passed directly to Stewardship & Finance. The actual amounts need confirmation, but \$3800 is estimated for the approved funding of a bookkeeper and an accountant to manage our books and to set up Quick Books for the Meeting. Some \$2000 from CREC, camping, which has been offset by a designated contribution, \$500 from the Peace & Social Concerns Committee and \$581 from Meetinghouse & Lands, will defray these costs. The use of our 2009 surplus, of a similar amount, will be discussed next month, when the final numbers are tabulated. Appreciation was extended to those involved, for the all the hard work on these efforts.

Peace and Social Concerns Committee: Phil F. reporting: A \$500 contribution to AFSC was sent from the Emergent Social Concerns Fund, 1_20_10, for relief in Haiti. Our hearts and prayers go out to the Haitians, who have suffered this tragic earthquake that occurred there on First Month 12th, 2010. We were reminded that the use of this fund does not require prior approval from business meeting. We were further reminded of our immense gratitude for our current abundance.

Ministry and Worship Committee: Marcia O. clerking an open discussion: An exploration to discover ways to increase attendance at Meeting for Business was entertained; additionally, ways to make Meeting for Business more spiritually led were considered. The discussion included changing the days and times of day to hold Meeting for Business, a brown bag lunch after Meeting for Worship, at 12:30, ending worship after half an hour, or possibly holding Business Meeting on an occasional weeknight. It was noted that a clear ending time needs to be set. Since the ones who attend, approve the time Business Meeting is held, it remains unchanged. Outreach suggested an early Meeting for Worship followed by Meeting for Business. Experimenting with different times is attractive but routine is important. Perhaps potluck could be offered at a different time from Meeting for Business. Holding Meeting for Business on the fifth first day was mentioned. A survey could be distributed by email and by hard copy to discern suggestions. We need to be respectful of our renters and their time using the building. Child care needs to be offered two young Friends from CREC may provide childcare, but we still need to ask for volunteers.

2/10 BUSINESS MEETING MINUTES - continued: Other concerns: Barbara T. reporting: Returning from New Zealand, she notes that their Yearly Meeting honors our testimonies as Social Testimonies and recognizes others as additional Religious Testimonies including: 'That of God in Everyone, Direct Communion with God, All of Life is Sacramental, and Continuing Revelation.' Our Ministry & Worship Committee will consider these additional Testimonies and the manual from New Zealand for discussion and possible Meetings for Learning.

The discussion about the publishing of our Minutes on the internet, now resides within the Outreach Committee. No clear decision has been reached; our Clerk will be in touch with the BYM webmaster for ideas and suggestions.

The Chesapeake Quarterly Meeting will be held here at Annapolis Friends Meeting on Third Month, 13,14&15. The flyer will be published and a paper announcement will be circulated.

NONVIOLENCE: TWENTY-FIVE LESSONS FROM THE HISTORY OF A DANGEROUS IDEA (2006)

Mark Kurlansky writes popular history books that focus not on great persons or single nations, but on commodities. His past works include: *Salt - World History* and *Cod - A Biography of the Fish that Changed the World*.

In *Nonviolence*, Kurlansky actually goes further than his title subject finding repeating cycles of war, nonviolent resistance, government repression, then gradual acquiescence to the peace movements' demands.

Ranging from Confucius and Tao in ancient China, through Christ and "Holy Wars," to Quakers and the modern peace movement, Kurlansky finds illustrations for his 25 lessons. Depending on your view, the exercise may be uplifting or discouraging. But it's a good history lesson in any event.

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
